
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Professional Responsibility (University Casebook Series)

A comprehensive teacher's manual is available as well. Since the last edition, published in 2011, the law has changed considerably. There have been: substantial changes in the ABA Rules of Professional Conduct adopted from the proposals of the ABA Ethics 20/20 Commission. Such changes include modifications to the confidentiality rules, the rules governing outsourcing, the choice of law regarding which professional responsibility rule to use, and provisions addressing contact with prospective clients a complete update reflecting the significant changes in the legal profession that have affected law firms, lawyers, and law students a substantial revision of the material dealing with advertising and solicitation new court decisions and ethics opinions â • in particular, dealing with conflicts of interest, imputed disgualifications, and ethics related to the internet, chat rooms, electronic discovery, etc.

It was a textbook for class. I really was not a fan of the book. It has a problem and explanation layout that was a little irritating to read. I didn't feel like I was learning PR. Wish me luck on the MPRE.

Hate this book. It fails to lay out a coherent structure for the Model Rules and how they interact with one another. Instead, the book gives a series of "Problems" (which would be helpful IF they were actually explained!), followed by endless questions surrounding the problems. The questions themselves are confusing, and the book neither gives answers nor explains how the questions even relate to the original Problem. Authorities (including the Restatement, which, who cares, it's not on the MPRE) are frequently cited with very little discussion of their importance or relationship to the problem. Overall, this book is a jumbled MESS. Get a test prep outline to learn PR.

I almost never write reviews, particularly on textbooks. Simply stated, most textbooks are neither good, nor bad enough, to warrant the time and energy. That said, this book is truly the worst legal textbook I have ever encountered. The unending hypothetical questions following its hundreds of poorly written case explanations are extraordinarily distracting and light years away from being useful. Moreover, this edition is absolutely fraught with typos. I would try my hardest to transfer out of any class utilizing this textbook, as any professor who thinks this book is a valuable tool to learning legal ethics is as out-of-touch with modern pedagogy as this book's distracted authors.-Law Student
